

- Total payments = \$22,895,311





Heiskell Area Electric System Upgrades

- Improves electric reliability in Heiskell community
- Creates a loop configuration for an alternate route to feed customers
- Final 1,200-foot section at 1121 East Bullrun Valley Drive needed to finish the 7-mile project
- 30' wide permanent easement required for equipment and tree trimming/removal



Easement Acquisition Process

- 7 of 8 completed
- Existing route unchanged
- Upsizes single phase to three phase circuitry which requires additional poles, anchoring, and vegetation clearing

Resolution 1408

- Authorizes the condemnation and the taking of utility easements on one parcel
- Allows for continued negotiations with property owners
- Directs that costs be paid by Electric Division
- Enables construction to proceed and complete project

- Fire began May 1, 2019
 - 65 Firefighters at peak
 - Burned over two days
 - 7.6M gallons of water used
- Safety Concerns
 - Area homes evacuated
 - Gas service on property
 - Electric services in area
 - Stored propane tanks
 - Air quality










Wastewater Project Near I275/Railroad



Costly Construction Near Railroad

- CCTV Camera footage showed pipe blockage
- Further inspection limited due to potential pipe collapse
- Design called for inherently dangerous deep excavation to repair unknown blockage
- Permitted and bid excavation protection cost of \$1.4M



Preconstruction Investigation

- Once awarded, WSE took initiative to inspect and clean main
 - Heavy cleaning and flushing cleared the blockage
 - Dangerous pipe replacement deemed unnecessary
 - "Engineered out" inherent safety risk
 - Able to use trenchless CIPP construction
- Proactive thinking saved KUB \$1.4M
