



Round It Up to Help Others



The new Round It Up program, which starts in May, will put your change to work in our community. Your donations will help weatherize homes for low-income families.

"It's probably not surprising that people at or below the poverty line live in older, energy-inefficient homes,"

said Jason Estes of the Knoxville-Knox County Community Action Committee (CAC), which will administer Round It Up. "Weatherizing those homes makes permanent changes to help the families save energy—which is good for our environment and make their utility bills more affordable. It also helps break the cycle of annual energy assistance requests to programs like Project Help."

Your small change each month can make a big difference. The average KUB customer will contribute about 50 cents a month. If half of all KUB customers participate, the program could raise \$600,000 a year to help our neighbors and to improve our community and our environment.

KUB will automatically round your bill up to the next dollar, so you don't have to do anything to start helping. But it's still your choice whether to help. If you don't want to participate you can:

- Check the "no" box under Round It Up on the form on the back of your KUB bill.
- Go to www.kub.org, log in or create an account, then go to My Account, Account Summary and click the "Active" link next to Round It Up [the link will change to "Inactive"].
- Call KUB at 524-2911 and press "6" for more information or to cancel your participation in the program.

Q&A KUB Answers Your Questions

Q: How can I sign up for the Levelized Billing Plan (LBP)? A: You can sign up on the back of your KUB bill or online at www.kub.org. LBP calculates your payment each month using a rolling 12-month average. That helps "level out" seasonal swings from very hot or cold months. Because your payment is recalculated each month, the payment amount will vary slightly to reflect a true rolling average.

Use Less Energy, Save More Money

Find Out How With Free Online Energy Audit

The more energy you use this winter, the higher your bill will be. Try these simple but effective tips to conserve and save:

- Lower your thermostat: You save about 1 percent on heating for each degree you cut back. [Try for 68 or lower.]
- Set it even lower [manually or by using a programmable thermostat] when you're sleeping or away from home. [Don't turn electric heat pumps back up by more than three degrees to avoid re-heating with expensive auxillary heat.]
- Use gas logs or other nonessential gas appliances sparingly.
- Don't cover or block heating vents.
- Seal leaks around doors or windows to keep heat in.

Call 811 Before You Dig

Call 811 at least three working days before you dig to have

underground utilities marked for free. It's the law, and the call helps protect you from dangerous and costly dig-



ins. Remember: Most customer-owned buried lines (like water, sewer laterals, and underground electric) will not be marked. Natural gas service lines, however, will be marked even though they're customer-owned.

Toilets Are Not Trash Cans!

Despite some marketing claims, flushing things like baby or personal wipes isn't a good idea. They can clog your pipes or jam sewer pumps, leading to backups into homes, sewer overflows, and costly repairs. Here's how you can help avoid plumbing problems and protect our environment:

- Never flush rags, baby/personal hygiene wipes, paper towels, shop towels, feminine products, dental floss, or disposable toilet wand heads.
- Never pour cooking grease down toilets or drains. Pour it in a can for disposal in the trash.
- Never flush prescription or overthe-counter drugs down drains or toilets. To help keep them out of waterways, take drugs to collection events or the permanent collection

events or the permanent collection site (open 24/7) in the lobby of the Knoxville Police Dept. Safety Building, 800 Howard Baker Jr. Ave.

Just because you can flush it doesn't mean you should. Think before you flush.
