Re: Traffic Advisory – Lane/Road Closures for Utility Work [All closures and work are weather permitting]

(South Knox) Chapman Highway Lane Closures [Weekdays, September 27 – October 22] – KUB crews will implement lane closures of the curbside lanes of Chapman Highway between Anderson Drive and Dick Ford Road weekdays from 9 a.m. – 3 p.m., starting Monday, September 27, through Friday, October 22, as work is completed on the electric distribution system in the area. The inside lanes and turn lanes will remain open during this time. Only the immediate work zone will be impacted, and the work zone will move between the north and southbound lanes as work progresses. Follow-up advisories will be issued as necessary.

(Downtown) Henley Street Intermittent Lane Closures [Overnight, September 28-29, September 30-October 1] – KUB crews will implement intermittent lane closures of the northbound lanes of Henley Street between W. Church Avenue and Summit Hill Drive (including the intersections) intermittently overnight 9 p.m. – 5 a.m., Tuesday night September 28-29, and Thursday night, September 30-October 1, as work is performed on the electric distribution system in the area. All areas will not be impacted at once. Traffic flow will be maintained in all directions. Follow-up advisories will be issued as necessary.

Some listed closures may extend beyond the scheduled times depending on the conditions encountered during excavation and construction. Appropriate traffic control measures will be in place at each location to assist motorists traveling in these areas. Due to the ongoing presence of workers and equipment, motorists are advised to use caution and expect temporary delays in these areas. Tennessee's **Move Over Law** requires motorists approaching a utility vehicle with flashing lights to move over if safe to do so, creating an empty lane buffer. When changing lanes is not possible, motorists must reduce speed.
